Overview:

This course will explore the history of US and international cities through a focus on urban design, urban history, cartography, and community development. Students will have the opportunity to engage local communities through research, service, and public scholarship. Throughout the course, special attention will be given to the issues of social justice, equity, and diversity.

Student Learning Objectives:

In this course, you will learn to:

- Think outside of cultural norms and values, including your own perspective, to critically engage the larger world;
- Interact with concepts, ideas, and processes related to civic engagement;
- Approach complex issues by taking a large question and breaking it down into manageable pieces:
- Make meaningful connections among assignments and readings in order to develop a sense of the "big picture":
- Collect, evaluate, and analyze information and resources to solve problems or answer questions:
- Express ideas clearly in writing and speaking in order to synthesize and evaluate information before presenting it;
- Identify, analyze, and summarize/represent the key elements of a text.
- Enter/Place themselves into an existing dialogue (intellectual, political, etc.)

Course Structure:

Class sessions use lectures, discussions, group activities, films and fieldwork. There will be periodic in-class assignments, such as write-up of group activities, which cannot be made up. *Informed participation* is an important part of the course evaluation. Informed participation is demonstrated by engaging in classroom discussions and activities using the knowledge you have gained from readings and other course work. Being physically present does NOT constitute 'informed participation'. Students are expected to complete the assigned daily readings and use the knowledge gained from those readings, to participate in both class discussions and group activities. These interactions are reflected in the 'participation in class discussions and activities' section of your grade
