# Nationalism in Italy: Understanding Language Death

- The comprehension of nationalistic attitudes is imperative to the rest of the language situation in Italy.
- Mussolini's Ban on Dialects (1923)
- “Privileged social groups that had already been Italianized were admitted into higher education, but large sectors of the rural community (the lower classes in the cities and the rural communities) were having to struggle in the classroom with a mother tongue that was, in actual fact, a foreign language.” (Arturo Tosi, *Language and Society in A Changing Italy*, p. 63).

Law & Policy: changes in education laws require regional languages to be taught in school

Education: instructors utilize resources and technology to effectively teach grammar, vocabulary, and accents



## A world of languages

There are at least 7,000 known languages alive in the world today. Twenty-three of these languages are a mother tongue for more than 50 million people. The 23 languages make up the native tongue of 4.3 billion people. We represent each language within black borders and then provide the numbers of native speakers (in millions) by country. The colors of these countries show how languages have taken root in many different regions.



② Countries whose figures for each language is too small to be represented have been put into a single group and marked with the symbol 'v'.



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
