2017 Organization Dream Award - Muslim Student Association

"The Muslim Student Association's purpose and mission is to create a community within the non-Muslim and Muslim students on the university of Washington Tacoma campus and the greater Tacoma community. Their mission is to share awareness of Islam and breakdown the stereotypes that surround us. They want to inform and educate UWT's diverse student body and community members about the religion of Islam as well focusing on- on going issues that surround them both locally and globally."

After a group of Muslim Student Association (M.S.A.) officers attended the MSA West Conference last January in California, they came back energetic and motivated to make their organization successful on our campus. This was a tipping point in the success of the organization, and they have had a number of strong programs since then.

Since returning from the conference, the students involved in the organization began hosting Jummah prayers and tafsir classes on campus. Jummah is a congregational prayer held in the early afternoon, and tafsir is teachings and interpretations from the Quaran and life of the profit. Led by a faculty member, they regularly have an average of 15 attendees at these events.

In February for National Hijab Day, MSA hosted an event on campus with students representing different countries and cultures, discussing and educating attendees on the meaning and importance of why Muslim women wear the Hijab. They hosted other educational programs during Islam Awareness Week. One successful event from that time was a "walk through" event in Commerce Plaza, where students passed out information and spoke with peers, testing their knowledge of Islam through some quiz questions and fun prizes.

During Ramadan this summer, they hosted an extremely successful Iftar, which is the dinner eaten after sunset during Ramadan to break one's fast. This was an extremely well attended event, drawing students, administrators and community members. The students presented a video composed of student and staff interviews, asking them to share what they knew about Ramadan. They shared personal Ramadan experiences from various times in their lives, and invited everyone to join them in eating delicious, traditional foods. They ended the final days of Ramadan with student profiles on their Facebook page, where they shared short interviews with a variety of students, both Muslim and non-Muslim. It was a great way to learn more about the experiences of


Muslim students on our campus and for non-Muslims to reflect on the importance that Ramadan carries for others.

Students that are involved with MSA see it as a safe place to discuss their faith, as well as other societal issues happening at this time. This quarter, the organization has helped organize a moment of silence following the Presidential election, and made it known that their organization meetings are a space where members can discuss ways in which to move the community forward in positive ways.

A major milestone for MSA this quarter was the establishment of a meditation room on campus. Student leaders from MSA worked with Chancellor Pagano to bring this initiative to life. This space is widely used by person of all faith and non-faith backgrounds. Continuing on this work, MSA has regular meetings with the Chancellor to discuss ways in which to support students of all religious backgrounds at UW Tacoma.

MSA's work is coming full circle, as they now embark on a substantial undertaking to bring a session of the same MSA West conference that inspired them, here to our campus. They have already begun researching potential speakers, presenters and workshops that could be invited to campus for this immersive session.

On campus, she serves as the First Generation Leadership Development Coordinator under Student Support Programs and the President of Latinxs Embracing Education Registered Student Organization. Nataley is also sits on the First Generation College Student Committee and the campus' Commencement Committee. Nataley stresses the importance of believing in one's self and encourages her peers to step out of their comfort zones.
