COLLEGE ACADEMIC DISTRIBUTION REQUIREMENTS


CADRs are coursework required by a university in order to be admitted.

AVID is a class taken in middle school/high school which aims to prepare all students for college readiness.



CREDIT

THE MEASURE OF THE AMOUNT OF APPLIED HOURS NEEDED TO COMPLETE A CLASS.

One college credit represents approximately one hour spent in a classroom and two hours spent on homework each week. Most single-semester college courses are worth three credits, or nine hours of work per week.

MAJOR

A SPECIFIC SUBJECT AREA THAT STUDENTS SPECIALIZE IN TO EARN A DEGREE.

Typically, between one-third and one-half of the courses taken in college will be related to your major.

MINOR

AN ADDITIONAL AREA OF SPECIALIZATION (25-35 CREDITS) MINORS ARE OPTIONAL.

Minors allow you to explore different courses and departments without the commitment of a major.
