SOCIAL WORK

Developed in collaboration with the University of Washington School of Social Work, the Bachelor of Arts in Social Welfare and the Master of Social Work degree programs prepare learners for generalist and specialized practice as providers of social services. Courses and field experience prepare graduates to become professional social workers in a wide variety of settings, including healthcare agencies, child and family services, public social service organizations, and public schools. An Advanced Standing MSW option is available to students who hold a bachelor's degree in social work or social welfare.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE

The school offers an innovative Bachelor of Arts in Criminal Justice with both on-campus and online options, along with a criminal justice minor. A social justice focus is applied to each course, making it a unique approach to criminal justice education. The curriculum attracts students who plan to seek employment with agencies serving crime victims, system-involved individuals and their families, as well as those interested in working in the criminal justice system or pursuing graduate degrees such as law school.
