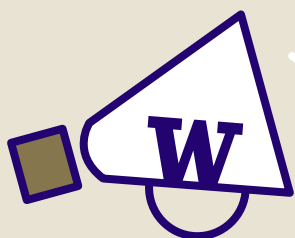

Build your professional skills and resume by receiving training on sharing your experiences in person, speaking directly with our campus leadership, Washington State Legislators and others, and advising the Student Affairs on their advocacy work by doing the following:

1. Share your story
2. Receive professional development on sharing your personal experience with legislators and funders
3. Meet with the Vice Chancellor of Student Affairs and her executive leadership team in January and April to help advise and shape this new program of work
4. Visit Olympia or attend an event between January-June to share your story
5. Participate in a closing reflection and receive advice on incorporating this experience into your resume and future professional interviews

As part of your participation, you will receive professional development and training, build your communication skills, learn about antiracist fundraising and political advocacy, and gain valuable experience for your resume.

All trainings and meetings will include food, and travel expenses will be covered by Student Affairs. Attendance at speaking opportunities will be communicated in advance and will not interfere with class attendance or other professional commitments.
