Program Overview

- Accredited by the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE)
- Sequenced Cohort Model
- 2 year full-time, day on campus program
- Field experience completed in second year applying classroom knowledge and skills to real-world settings.
 - Admits approximately 56 students yearly
 - Priority application deadline March 15 (Autumn Quarter admission only)
 often admit students after the deadline

Program Curriculum

- 68 credit program of study
 - Includes 440 hours of Field Experience (Practicum) in the second year of the program

Practicum

- Practicum is like an internship, in which you register and receive academic credit for your field experience.
 - 440 hours (11 credits)
 - Spans three quarters your second year
- Practicum agencies include those that serve:
 - K-12 students and schools
 - Behavioral health needs
 - Foster youth and families
 - LGBTQIA+
 - Unhoused population
 - Aging population
 - Individuals living with HIV/AIDS
 - Individuals with disabilities
 - Individuals connected to the criminal justice system



CWTAP Option (Child Welfare Training & Advancement)

- CWTAP offers a specialized public child welfare practicum within the BASW program.
- Students in their senior year of the BASW program who are desiring to work in public child welfare would be eligible. These students would do their practicum at the Department of Children, Youth and Families (DCYF) Child Welfare Program.
- CWTAP provides federal Title IV-E financial assistance (tuition) and specialized training and mentoring for the three quarters in practicum. In return, after graduation, students will work for the DCYF Child Welfare Program for an equal amount of time they received financial assistance. This program is similar to the MSW CWTAP that has been in our state for over 30 years.

Program Requirements

UW Health Sciences Immunization Policy

- All students in the Bachelor of Social Welfare Program must abide by the Health Sciences Immunization Policy (HSIP).
- Students must document immunity to Measles (Rubeola), Mumps, Rubella, Hepatitis B, Tetanus-Diphtheria-Pertussis, Varicella (chicken pox), TB screening, and seasonal influenza vaccine. The influenza vaccine must be renewed each year you are in the program.
- Students must provide verification of vaccination for COVID-19.
- NO EXCEPTIONS



Post Acceptance-Program Requirements

If you are offered admission, and you accept, you will order a background check through CastleBranch, a third-party vendor. This is required for Practicum.



Who are our faculty?

- Faculty have research interests which include:
 - Violence prevention
 - Disapportionality in the child welfare system
 - Disabilities
 - LGBTQIA+
 - Gender studies
 - Arts and humanities in social work practice
 - Animal assisted therapy
 - Race and transnational adoption

 - Justice involved youth

Many faculty also come with practice experience working with the homeless, immigrants, substance abuse, mental health, healthcare, etc.

Admission Criteria



BASW Prerequisites

- Successful completion (minimum grade of 2.0)
 - Intro to English Composition
 - Intro to Sociology*
 - Intro to Psychology*
 - Minimum of 75 college-level and transferable credits

* Applicants can be considered for admission if one or both of these courses are planned for an upcoming quarter and are encouraged to apply.



Essay and Resume

- You will write a two page essay which will provide autobiographical information and discuss your experiences with human and/or social services.
 - The essay is the most important element of your application.
- You will provide a current resume. If you have social service experience (paid or unpaid), please highlight this on your resume in addition to any special skills or certifications.



Who is a strong candidate?

- Articulate a strong commitment to social justice
- Articulate a desire to work with diverse populations in a social service capacity
- Has experience (paid or unpaid) in social or human services – experience is NOT required however.



Who are our students?

- Range in age from 18 55 years old
- Attend from Pierce, King, Thurston and Kitsap counties
- Most students work at least part-time
- Average GPA of incoming students is 3.13
