What is Social Work?

Social Workers will:

- Address social problems & influence social change
- Care about local community and social justice
- Work in many occupations but apply common core values, techniques, and principles (must have a degree in SW)
- Seek higher education: MSW enrollment has increased by 34.9% over the last 10 years (CSWE 2020)
- Be in high demand: projected job growth through 2028: 11%
 compared to 5%, the average for all U.S. occupations
 (Bureau of Labor Statistics 2019)

UW Tacoma MSW Program

- 3-year <u>part-time</u> MSW program
 - Admits approximately 45-50 students each year
 - Autumn Quarter admission only

- * 18-month **part-time** Advanced Standing MSW program
 - Admits approximately 15-20 students each year
 - Winter Quarter admission only
 - BSW or BASW Required (must be CSWE accredited)



Class Schedule

- 2-3 Classes per week for each quarter
- Each class meets once per week
- During Practicum (Begins in Summer):
 - 1-2 Classes + 1 Practicum
- Quarter: 10 weeks
 - Autumn: September December
 - Winter: January March
 - Spring: March June
 - Summer: June August

Practicum

- Practicum is like an internship, in which you register and receive academic credit for your field experience.
 - Generalist Practicum (not required for AS program)
 - 400 hours (10 credits)
 - Spans 3 quarters
 - Begins the Summer of the first-year curriculum
 - Specialization Practicum
 - 680 hours (17 credits)
 - Spans 4 quarters
 - Begins the Summer of the second-year curriculum

Admissions



UW Graduate School Admission Requirement

- Hold a baccalaureate degree from a regionally accredited college or university in the U.S. or its equivalent from a foreign institution.
 - Advanced Standing applicants Must have a BSW or BASW from a U.S. program accredited by the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE).
- Have a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA in your last 90 graded quarter credits or 60 graded semester credits.*

*Students with below a 3.0 gpa are encouraged to apply, however, admission is subject to UW Graduate School departmental petition approval.



Application Process

 Start an application with the UW Graduate School <u>https://grad.uw.edu/admission/apply-now/</u>

*Applicants must select:

Social Work - Tacoma Campus (Master of Social Work-Part Time Program) or

Social Work - Tacoma Campus MSW (Advanced Standing) in the menu of program choices on the program selection section.

2. Complete the application via the online app system

*Application materials/questions are supplied via the app system. Uploaded supplemental materials will consist of a resume, the MSW essay and unofficial transcripts



Application Requirement

- UW Tacoma MSW Application for the appropriate year
- Admission Essay (Essay questions provided online and via our website)
- Unofficial Transcripts from <u>each</u> college or university attended
- Resume
- Social Service Experience
- Three professional and/or academic references
 - *Advanced Standing applicants are required to have a recommendation from a field instructor or social service employer.
 - *If you graduated within the last two years from an undergraduate institution, one of the three recommendations is required to come from an academic reference. If you have been out of school for more than two years, the three recommendations can come from any combination of academic or professional experiences.
- UW HSIP, background check, social work program and commitment Acknowledgements



Application Deadline

- 3-year MSW: priority deadline and early review on 02/01, program closes and final review on 03/30
- Advanced Standing MSW: priority deadline and early review on 05/01, program closes and final review on 06/30



Admission Decision Announcement

- 3-year MSW: Early decisions in late February (for completed applications by the priority deadline) and all final decisions by Mid-May
- Advanced Standing: Early decisions in late May (for completed applications by the priority deadline) and all final decisions by Early August



Prior to Enrollment

- Successful completion of a college level statistics course (4 credits min. with a C or 2.0 or better grade)
- UW Health Sciences Immunizations Policy (HSIP):
 Document immunity to Measles (Rubeola), Mumps,
 Rubella, Hepatitis B, Tetanus-Diphtheria-Pertussis,
 Varicella (chicken pox), COVID-19, and have a current
 TB screening and annual seasonal influenza vaccine
- Comprehensive Background Check (does not impact admission status)

- Start search a year before funding is needed
- Most deadlines 6-12 months before payout

Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or the Washington Application for State Financial Aid (WASFA):

- UW Title IV Code: 003798
- Student Loans and Scholarships are the primary source of funding in part-time graduate programs
- Some grants may require a full-time student status
