Items

1. Review minutes from 1.10.2025: [Graduate Meeting minutes 01.10.2025](#)

2. Top Scholar Funding- Research Assistant Quarters - May 1st deadline

Wes shared that the committee has been approved to award Top Scholar Funding to up to 3 students for one quarter of RA funding, with a requirement to match it with two quarters. The deadline to leverage the funding is May 1st.

Eligibility Criteria:

- Students must be new to the UW Graduate School (not continuing students).
- Martine clarified that students who previously attended UW for a different degree program (e.g., undergraduate) may still qualify if they are new to the graduate program.
- Rachel Crook will email the detailed eligibility requirements to the committee.

Committee members to identify potential candidates and provide feedback.

3. Update: 2024-25 CSS Faculty Search – Juhua (done in css department meeting)

- a. Four candidates for faculty positions will be visiting next week (Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and the following Tuesday). Faculty and students are encouraged to attend meet-and-greet sessions with the candidates.
- 4. Update: MS in AI Foundations and Applications (MS AIFA) – Juhua**
 - a. Juhua mentioned to finalize the budget with Leslie early next week
- 5. SET Research Showcase: Mar 14 (abstracts), Apr 28 (posters), May 9 @ 2 - 5:30p (event)**
 - a. Abstract deadline: March 14th. Poster submission deadline: April 28th. Event date: May 9th 2-5:30

- 6. MSCSS Review Committee and Rubric ([link](#))**
 - a. The MSCSS Review Committee has developed a rubric for admissions. Key points:
 - i. Applicants must meet prerequisite courses (e.g., algorithms, TCSS 343).
 - ii. English proficiency requirements: TOEFL, IELTS, or Duolingo scores.
 - iii. GPA below 3.0 requires a waiver process.
 - iv. GRE scores are no longer required, placing more emphasis on GPA, letters of recommendation, resumes, and personal statements.
 - v. Martine De Cock suggested adding a note to ensure applicants with low English proficiency scores are strong in other areas to avoid undue burden.
 - b. Rachel provided an update on applications:
 - i. MSCSS: 106 applications received, 27 admitted, 7 denied, 39 in review, and 27 missing materials.
 - ii. GC-SDE Certificate Program: 7 applications received, 4 admitted, and 3 missing materials.
 - iii. Certificate Program: 7 applications received, 4 admitted, and 3 missing materials.
 - iv. PhD Program: 14 applications received, 7 denied, 6 in review, and 1 admitted (working with Dongfang).
- 7. Winter PhD student Meeting - Friday: Feb 21, 28, Mar 14**
 - a. A PhD Student Meeting is being scheduled for February 28th (tentative).
 - b. The meeting will include a seminar on PhD expectations and a Q&A panel with faculty members.

- 8. Winter GTA Group Meeting (from TA policy document) – Wei**

- a. Wei Cheng discussed the need for regular GTA Group Meetings (monthly or bi-weekly). Rachel confirmed that Chloe will assist with scheduling. Action Item: Faculty with GTAs to help build the agenda for the first meeting.

9. PhD CSS program - capacity limits - from original proposal

- a. Wes raised concerns about the PhD program capacity, as the original proposal capped enrollment at 13 students after five years.
- b. The committee discussed whether to request an increase in capacity due to the addition of new faculty and advising capacity.
- c. Martine explained that the original numbers were based on budget and feasibility at the time.
- d. Ankur emphasized celebrating the program's success and avoiding unnecessary restrictions.
- e. Raj highlighted the need for clear policies and a strong research culture to ensure program success. What size do we envision?
- f. Rachel has drafted a PhD Handbook, separating it from the MSCSS Handbook. The draft includes graduate school policies, committee formation, and advisor change processes.
- g. Ka Yee and Juhua suggested creating a PhD Newsletter or quarterly updates to celebrate student accomplishments.
