SPECIAL ALLOCATIONS - CRITERIA

Our proposal fits within the criteria for **emergency expenditures** as outlined in the Special Allocation process. The need for additional promotional items for the **Spring Day of Caring** event was not anticipated during the annual budget process, as event participation and volunteer engagement have significantly increased since the initial planning stages. This growth reflects the success of our civic engagement initiatives, but has also created an unexpected demand for additional materials to properly recognize and support all participants.

The **Spring Day of Caring** is a cornerstone volunteer event that unites students, faculty, and staff in service to the local community. Promotional items, such as branded merchandise, play a crucial role in this event by serving as both tokens of appreciation for volunteers and as tools to increase awareness of civic engagement opportunities at UW Tacoma. These items help build pride and visibility around the event, encouraging sustained participation and a stronger culture of service on campus.

Without this special allocation, we risk being unable to provide these materials adequately to the growing number of volunteers, which may diminish the overall impact and experience of the event. The additional funding would therefore address an unforeseen need arising from the positive expansion of the program, rather than a planned or recurring expense.

In short, this request meets the **emergency expenditure** criterion because the increased demand for volunteer recognition items could not have been predicted during budget preparation, and immediate funding is necessary to ensure the continued quality, inclusivity, and success of this signature campus event.

Data from these assessments indicate that students feel more confident in their leadership abilities, are more connected to the campus community, and are more motivated to engage in future service. Qualitative feedback reinforces these findings, with students frequently describing their experiences as "transformative," "eye-opening," and "empowering."


